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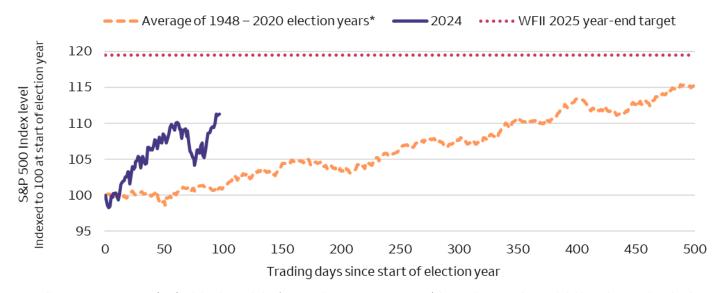

Reason to stay in equities despite election uncertainty

The S&P 500 Index has done well to start the year, but we see reason to stay invested

U.S. Large Cap Equities, as measured by the S&P 500 Index, are off to a strong start to the year — the index has gained just over 10% year to date (through May 24), toward the upper end of our 5100 – 5300 year-end 2024 target range. Despite election-related uncertainty, outperformance at this point in the election cycle relative to history, and our expectation for markets to remain range bound for most of the year, we see further potential upside into year-end 2025.

For context, the chart above looks at the S&P 500 Index's average performance during an election year and the postelection year. On average, markets have historically seen an overall uptrend through elections, and the past three election cycles have seen particularly strong performance. Notably, these three periods also saw increasing economic growth, which we expect in 2025. Therefore, in our view, elections are not a reason to withdraw from the markets.

What it may mean for investors

We encourage investors to maintain their overall exposure to U.S. Large Cap Equities, on which we are favorable, and avoid siphoning off cash to time a cheaper entry point later. Trying to time markets to reinvest later is difficult, with significant drawbacks from missing out on periods — sometimes even days — of strong performance. Further, while current cash returns are attractive, we do not see it as a good place for funds to be longer term given our expectation for lower interest rates as the Federal Reserve's rate cycle plays out.
